POTTERSPURY PARISH COUNCIL - RISK ASSESSMENT RE-OPENING OF PLAY AREAS, PLAY EQUIPMENT, OUTDOOR GYM EQUIPMENT, MUGA & SKATEPARK Adopted by Potterspury Parish Council 8 July 2020

The Government recently announced that Play Parks could be re-opened on 4 July 2020 and subsequently produced guidance offering "practical advice on how these can be reopened and managed effectively to enable their use while minimising the transmission risk of COVID-19". The guidance is available at:

The guidance includes a requirement to "carry out an appropriate COVID-19 risk assessment". It is made very clear that "Failure to complete a risk assessment which takes account of COVID-19, or completing a risk assessment but failing to put in place sufficient measures to manage the risk of COVID-19, could constitute a breach of health and safety law". On that basis, this Risk Assessment takes each of the Key Principles as set out in the guidance and assesses whether or not practical arrangements can be put in place in the context of the play areas and equipment in Potterspury.

The village play areas provide much-needed areas to exercise in a safe environment. Advice from the Government, SLCC and NCALC has been noted. Whilst it must be acknowledged that there is risk of the transmission of Covid 19, it is the view of the Parish Council that the steps outlined above will enable the play areas to re-open as safely as possible.
